What Does MWUA Do For You?

What does Maine Water Utilities Association do for you? You've probably considered that question as you've paid the bill for your dues, or answered an inquiry for a potential member. I've been reminded in the last month of one piece (and there are many) of the association's purpose – and that is legislative oversight as it relates to the water supply profession.

That oversight runs the gamut – from our Legislative and Regulatory Affairs Committee and executive director monitoring and testifying on proposed laws and regulations that affect how we run our offices, plants, and distribution systems to each member speaking to their community members (that includes local rule makers) on the importance of drinking water funding.

MWUA reviews submitted rule-making each time the Legislature is in session, often preparing summaries, distributing information, and recommending action to the Board based on possible consequences. Have you offered an opinion?

This spring, members of MWUA representing various size utilities reviewed proposed changes to the MPUC's regulations impacting billing, payments, and disconnection of service. A work group generated ideas. Many utilities submitted written comments. Another dozen utilities testified at a public hearing. Did you?

Most recently, MWUA was involved in the "Question 5" bond issue, requesting \$10,250,000 in order to leverage another \$33,250,000 of federal funds for drinking water and wastewater projects. I spoke to the media, both as the MWUA president and as the general manager of the Bangor Water District voicing the importance of its passage. Without this funding, eligible systems in Maine would lose the opportunity to receive SRF funding for treatment and distribution improvements in the form of low-interest loans and grants for qualified projects. This opportunity to invest in essential projects to protect public health is critical to our communities, but passed by a 55 to 45 percent

margin. How could we improve support for future bond issues?

MWUA's mission is to be an advocate for the water supply profession. Help us with our mission. Share your opinions. Give a voice. Get involved.



Installation of Brewer Water Department's New Raw Water Intake into Hatcase Pond

The Brewer Water Department recently installed a new 24 inch intake at Hatcase Pond in Dedham. The new intake will be in deeper, colder water and further away from the impacts of a tributary. The project creates redundancy and enhances Brewer's ability to supply Bangor during times of emergency.

Horizontal directional drilling was employed to install the pipe. The drilling apparatus was set up 250 feet from the pond, a boring was made to the bottom of the pond, and the pipe was pulled back to the wetwell. This technique minimized the water quality impact on the pond.

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The June Meeting

It's always nice in the County and the June meeting this year was no exception. More than a few fish were caught on the way up and an informal cookout Wednesday evening at the Central Aroostook Snowmobile Club was enjoyed by many.

The meeting on Thursday was well attended and the topics were timely and informative. Presque Isle's new City Manager, Jim Bennett, welcomed us to town. He then introduced someone who needed no introduction – Steve Freeman, the Superintendent of the Presque Isle Water and Sewer District.

Steve reviewed the efforts of the district in locating and developing a new groundwater source to replace Presque Isle Stream, their surface water supply. It has not been an easy road as there were issues with the new source being under the influence of surface water. The new source also created Lead & Copper Rule compliance issues.

Al Hitchcock, Superintendent of the Caribou Utilities District, then explained the process they undertook to locate and develop a groundwater source. The fact that they had much easier sledding highlights the fact that not all groundwaters have similar chemical make ups.

After the break, Larry Girvan provided a detailed regulatory update.

The morning closed out with Chuck Kelley, owner of Industrial Instrumentation and Controls, and who is also an instructor at NMCC and a Limestone Water & Sewer District trustee, presenting a very detailed and informative session titled: Efficiency in the Works: Dollars and Sense. He concentrated on energy saving opportunities to be found with current operations and the paybacks that can be realized. He emphasized the usefulness of energy audits and then displayed infrared inspection equipment and showed us the pictures he has taken, which depict heat buildup, loss, etc. and the story that tells. Chuck ended with a discussion of a number of other tools and resources which systems can access in order to implement energy saving measures.

Obviously, the low hanging energy savings can be realized with a little effort. As energy costs rise, the more detailed or costly measures will become more attractive from a payback period.

The luncheon was very good and many enjoyed it out on the deck. The weather was very nice and that made for a nice ride back home or to the next fishing hole, whatever the case might be.

The Business Loses Two Very Good Men

We were recently saddened to hear of the death of two men, known to many, who left their mark on the water supply profession.

Donald Almon Holbrook Sr., 67, of Kennebunkport, died Sunday, May 30, 2010, at Gosnell Memorial Hospice House in Scarborough. He was born in Saco on Jan. 23, 1943, grew up in Cape Porpoise, and graduated from Kennebunk High School in 1961. During his high school days, Don was a star athlete who lettered in football, basketball, baseball and track.

In 1963, he began a 41 year career with the Kennebunk Water District, retiring in 2004 as Assistant General Foreman. Don was an avid outdoorsman who enjoyed hunting, fishing, archery, gardening and all wildlife.

He is survived by his wife of 37 years, Mitzi; two sons, three daughters, a brother and a sister, and 10 grandchildren.

Malcolm Richard Horton, 84, died June 10, 2010 at Mount Desert Island Hospital. He was born



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September 26, 1925 at home in Surry. Malcolm graduated from Bar Harbor High School in 1943 and enlisted in the U.S. Army in September of that year. He was attached to the 94th Infantry Division as a rifle squad leader in the European Theater, landing at Utah Beach and fighting at the Battle of the Bulge. He saw considerable action and was awarded the Purple Heart, Bronze Star with one oak leaf cluster, Combat Infantry Badge and E.A.M.E. Campaign Ribbon with four battle stars. Upon his discharge in 1947 he attended college. In 1957 he returned to Bar Harbor and pursued a career as a Certified Public Accountant.

Malcolm was a partner at Horton, McFarland, Veysey, LLC in Ellsworth. He performed audits, filed and administered rate cases and managed financial functions for many of the water utilities in Maine. He was the auditor for the association. His annual visit for the audit always included lobster stew for lunch at the local diner.

He is survived by his wife of 23 years, Movita, two sons, three daughters, two stepsons, one stepdaughter, 11 grandchildren and 3 great-grandchildren.

Brewer Signs Protective Easement with Watershed Landowners

The Brewer Water Department recently took another important step forward in protecting the watershed around Hatcase Pond, the city's drinking water supply, by signing a conservation easement with the Mountainy Pond Club, a group of prominent

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landowners in Dedham, which will permanently protect 510 acres directly surrounding the pond.

The Hatcase Pond watershed covers 1718 acres of land (2.7 square miles) around the 163 acre pond, with 80% located in the Town of Dedham and 20% in the Town of Eddington. The conservation easement represents approximately 30% of the overall watershed, and includes more than 11,400 feet of frontage on the pond.

"This is without a doubt the most important parcel of land that needed permanent protection from development, due to its close proximity to the pond and the large amount of shore frontage involved", stated Brewer Water Department Superintendent Mike Riley.

An important component of the Water Department's mission is to protect Hatcase Pond and the land within its watershed so that future generations may enjoy the same excellent water quality that customers currently receive.

Most importantly, according to Riley, the easement demonstrates to the USEPA that the city is actively fulfilling the requirement, contained in the city's filtration avoidance waiver with the EPA, to protect water quality in Hatcase Pond by either owning or having land use control of land within the watershed. Ownership or control of the watershed is considered the

least expensive form of water treatment and will allow the City of Brewer to avoid the cost of constructing a multi-million dollar filtration plant.

Including this easement, the Brewer Water Department now owns or has conservation easements on about 80% of the land within the watershed. The Department is currently pursuing conservation easements on the remaining 350 acres, which are located further away from the pond.

Augusta Office Location Approved by Board

The Office Relocation Committee has viewed many potential office space locations for MWUA over the past few months, and on June 3rd, the Board of Directors voted to approve the recommendation presented by the Committee. MWUA will be moving to 150 Capitol Street in Augusta in August of this year.

This location is central to many water utilities in Maine, making it an easily accessible location for many members. The new office space has plenty of parking, and will be hosting committee and board meetings in the future. It is very convenient short walk to the Capitol Building as well. We are excited about the move, and would encourage you to stop in to check it out.

Chapter 660 Comments Submitted

The May issue of the newsletter referenced the fact that The Maine Public Utilities Commission had proposed a new rule - Chapter 660: Consumer Standards for Water Utilities – the purpose of which is to consolidate existing Chapters 81 and 86.

Extensive comments were submitted by water utilities and others. Many of the comments are similar, such as: maintain the exceptions in Chapter 81 for systems with less than 1,500 customers, the new record keeping and reporting requirements in the proposed rule will create additional and significant costs for systems, and a rule modified from a previous rewrite for the large investor-owned utilities may not be the best model to start from.

Like many who provided comments, MWUA addressed the proposed revisions section by section. It was only possible to do that because a number of water utility staff met, discussed the proposal in detail, and developed comments. That was extremely helpful and that effort is much appreciated.

The association's comments were based on the principle that the requirements of the rule should be what are necessary in order to deliver quality water


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service. It was stated that the provision of additional information on water bills and the implementation of additional processes does not necessarily equate to improved customer service.

MWUA did not support the concept of continuing to exempt utilities with fewer than 1,500 residential customers from certain provisions of the rule. Rather, we advocated that Appendix A of Chapter 81 (the requirements that currently apply to the exempted systems) be the basis for water utility service standards for all water utilities in Maine and that the provisions of Chapter 86, which can be justified for water utilities (regardless of size), be merged into the new rule. We also requested that a collaborative workgroup be assembled to accomplish that.

It was also pointed out that there appears to be shift of emphasis in that Chapter 81 sets forth utility service standards and the proposed rule focuses on consumer protection standards. It was requested that the emphasis of the rule continue to be utility service standards and that the new rule align with, and not create conflicts with, the water utilities' responsibilities and obligations relative to drinking water regulations.

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July 1 Revised Website Launch Date

MWUA to Partner with JETCC, MWWCA on Management Candidate School

In 2009-2010 the Joint Environmental Training Coordinating Committee (JETCC), in concert with the MWWCA, held a Management Candidate School. The purpose of the school was to provide targeted training for wastewater personnel who are transitioning from operations to management.

The 2010-2011 curriculum is being modified so that it is inclusive to the needs of water supply personnel. All classes, which are held once a month for 6 hours each day, will be held at the Bangor Wastewater Treatment Facility. The class starts on Tuesday, October 19. The classes will be held the 3rd Tuesday of each

month for the remainder of 2010, and the 2nd Tuesday of each month from January through August 2011.

The curriculum includes an introduction to the personnel management book, basic aquatic biology, the permitting process (for wastewater) and source water/well head protection (for water). Also included will be training on asset management, real world management and leadership skills, effective communication, long range planning for system needs, personnel management and labor/regulatory relations, engineering basics and an operator exchange at the end of the training.

Five of the 20 slots have been reserved for water operators. The cost of the school for water supply personnel will be no more than \$500 per student. Students must commit to attending all classes. Upon completion graduates will receive 68 - 72 credit hours of class time, and those credits can be spread over two license renewal cycles (water, wastewater or both).

Registration will be through Maine JETCC. A Management Candidate School announcement will be sent to facility managers in July. Visit at www.jetcc.org for registration information as well.
